## **Bible Study: Commissioning**

<sup>16</sup> Then the eleven disciples left for Galilee, going to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. <sup>17</sup> When they saw him, they worshiped him—but some of them doubted!

<sup>18</sup> Jesus came and told his disciples, "I have been given all authority in heaven and on earth. <sup>19</sup> Therefore, go and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. <sup>20</sup> Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

Matthew 28:16-20 (New Living Translation)



We may be familiar with Jesus' command to 'Go and make disciples', but I wonder how many of us hear that command for ourselves? Isn't that just for those who are good at 'talking the talk' – who are confident speaking to others about the gospel? Jesus said, 'Go and make disciples' to his disciples, but that command is for us too. None of us can guarantee that others will come to faith, but we are called to share our faith. But how do we do that at school, in our places of work and leisure, and in the communities in which we live?

How many people in our churches have come to faith because of some evangelistic event? How many people have come to know Jesus because they got to know someone who knew Jesus and then realised Jesus was someone worth knowing? We're called to 'make more disciples', but we do that by being disciples, by following and trying to be more like Jesus, and by living and breathing our faith. We may not all be great preachers, but we don't have to be. People will know when we're speaking with honesty and integrity about our faith. We just need to have the courage to try and to not be afraid to make mistakes.

- How might you offer the invitation to others to explore the call of Jesus to follow Him (noting the root meaning of the word disciple is one who learns as they follow)?




As we focus on 'Making more disciples', how will you make the most of the opportunity to make more disciples in your church, in your community and in your own personal discipleship?

Martyn Atkins





John Sentamu



Discover what people think of Jesus, Christians, and evangelism in the UK today.
















The research found conversations with Christians are one of the most important influences in bringing people to faith. The Talking Jesus course will inspire you to share your faith and will give you practical suggestions to help you to be natural and relevant as you talk about Jesus with the people you meet.

There are six encouraging, video-based sessions with short films, inspirational, short testimonies, real-life examples from people who are talking Jesus, and a short, easy-to-follow course book.

After Holy Habits in 2018, a number of small groups used the "Talking Jesus" course and found it really valuable. We recommend small groups consider following this course again next year. If anyone would be interested in starting a group to complete the 6 sessions, please speak to someone from the leadership team.
